


PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS

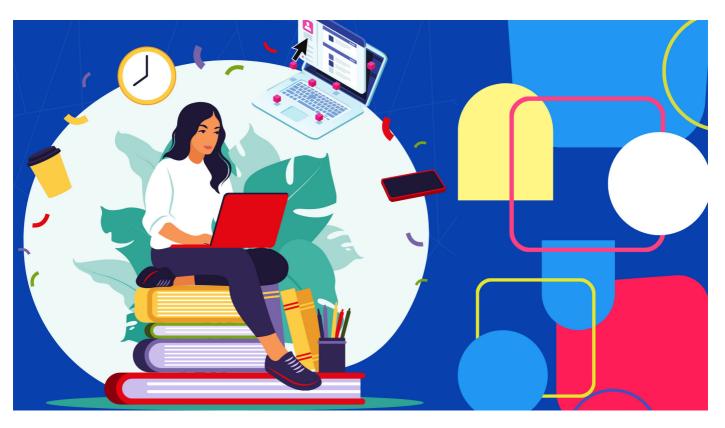
